DENDROBIUM STRATIOTES

Dendrobium stratiotes is found in Western Papua New Guinea and on many of the Indonesian islands. It grows on trees in forests at lower elevations and likes hot to warm conditions.

It flowers in Summer and Autumn.

Dendrobium stratiotes likes bright light but not full sun in the middle of the day in Summer.

During winter, water and fertiliser should be reduced but the mix should not become bone dry. With the onset of new growth in Spring, watering and fertilising should be resumed.

I bought this plant as a seedling at the Gympie Show in May 2018. Over the winter it died back. It must have had too much water.

It was repotted in a medium bark mix in September 2018 (Spring), and hasn't look back. It's responded well to lots of water and fertiliser, has put out several new growths, and is looking healthy.

It was repotted again in February 2021 and hung very high in the shade house under 50% shade cloth.

This is its first flowering.

CHANGES IN ORCHID NOMENCLATURE - CATTLEYA ALLIANCE

Picking up where we left off in the March edition of The Observer, this article explores the hybrid influence of the Guaranthes and Rhyncolaelias in a photo essay format. We'll also discuss the Cattleyoid Laelias that became Cattleyas.

Cattleyoid Laelias became Cattleyas

The large flowered Brazilian Laelias were moved into the Cattleya genus in 2006. While this did not result in any need for new intergeneric names, it has changed the names of many familiar orchids – Laelia purpurata has been in the parentage of perhaps 90% of the previously called Laeliocattleya orchids that are now known as Cattleyas.

Cattleyoid Lelias moved into the Cattleya genus

- · C. crispa
- C. grandis
- · C. lobata

Other Brazilian Laelias also became Cattleyas

The rest of the Brazilian Laelias including the colourful Brazilian rupicolous Laelias, were moved into the Cattleya genus in 2008. Only Laelias from Mexico and Central America are now still considered to be Laelias.

Other Laelias moved into the Cattleya genus

Schomburgkias eliminated, plants split into Myrmecophilas and Lelias

The hollow pseudobulb Schomburgkias were moved into the Myrmecophila genus – the genus name, which meant ant lover and referred to the symbiotic relationship these plants had with ants living within the hollow pseudobulbs, is no more. This also eliminated the intergeneric Schombocattleyas (Smbc.), etc. DNA analysis has proved the solid pseudobulbed Schomburgkias are more closely related to the Mexican Laelias such as L. anceps.

Some of the Schomburgkias moved into Myrmecophila

Mcp. albopurpurea, Mcp. brysiana, Mcp. exaltata, Mcp. thomsoniana, Mcp. tibicinis.

Schomburgkias moved into the Laelia genus

- · L. Iyonsii
- L. rosea
- · L. splendida
- · L. superbiens
- L. undulata

Sophronitis moved into the Cattleya genus

Finally, all the Sophronitis species were moved into the Cattleya genus. These mostly cool growing orchids have been used to impart their intense red coloration to their progeny.

Lumping the Sophronitis in with the Cattleyas eliminated the need for many intergeneric names like Sophrocattleya (SC.), Sophrolaelia (Sl.), Sophrolaeliocattleya (Slc.) and Potinara (Pot.).


